The brilliant record of the Band during the past two seasons is a record in every sense of the word. Eleven Contests attended—Eleven First Prizes, including two at the Crystal Palace in succession.

The record established has never been known before and may never be known again in the 2nd Division of the London and Home Counties. Much of this success is due to the capable teaching and handling of the Band by the Musical Director, Mr. J. C. Dyson, who is very proud of the Band indeed. Mr. Dyson shares this honour with the Bandmaster, Mr. F. Drain, who has worked very hard for the success attained.

It has meant much hard work and sacrifice on the part of the Bandsmen also, but they are well pleased at their achievements.

In addition to the number of First Prizes secured, the Band have also won the Championship of the London and Home Counties' Association, 2nd Division, with 100% points.


Next season, which commences with the London and Home Counties' Contest at East Ham, on November 16th, the Band compete in the 1st Division, the Championship of the London and Home Counties, where their task will be much more difficult. But there are still some First Prizes in that Division which Northfleet will have if there is a possible chance!

With such strong opposition that is to come and consequent expense, the Officials and the Band hope that the public and supporters will rally round and encourage them in the fresh fields they are out to conquer.

W. Humphrey, who is now quite acclimated to receiving First Prizes on behalf of the Band. He is a very keen Contester and has led the Band to the field of the various Competitions with words of encouragement; he has been the first to praise their efforts.

ADJUDICATORS' NOTES on the Band's Performance at the Crystal Palace.

Test Piece - - "Lorenzo,"

Maestoso. Good opening with balance and precision.

Allegro. A little ragged in opening bars, but a quick recovery although cornets didn't maintain their style to the end.

Meno Mosso. Just a trifle slow, but quite interesting on the whole.

Meno Mosso. A good section, but still a little on the slow side.

Schezando. An interesting movement played with precision and

vitality.

Meno Mosso. Phrasing and expression a good feature here. Euphonium is doing well. A little ragged at (12) and a slip four bars late in unison passage.

Meno Mosso. Basses playing well.

• Quasi Larghetto. Good balance here, but in seventh bar after (17) the movement was ragged. From (19) the band worked up to a good climax. Accompaniments well managed.

Allegro. A good fanfare. Tempo well grasped and balance well

maintained.

Una Jesta. Well articulated, but piu mosso a trifle on the quick side.

Allegro. Much brilliant playing in evidence here, leading to a well articulated finale.

A very good rendering!

Maestoso. The beginning is well attacked and the bass subject is well heard (1). "Trumpets" good, but not maintained to close. Tone good.

Meno Mosso. Slow tempo. Accompaniments neat. Soloists play well on the whole. (4) Clear and bright. Neat to close. Tulti is well

played also. Soprano good. Neat style. Close is nice.

At (7) band play brilliantly to close. Fine conception. The technique is superior. Phrasing good indeed. Euphonium in *meno mosso* plays splendidly. Basses play well—rich and full. A few bursted notes are heard now and then. Climaxes are capitally "realised." Good toned band. Soprano rings out well. A splendid conception.

(15) is admirably given. Articulation neat.

(16) sees a good horn and his mates, also, play very well indeed. Good number—the interpretation is "superior." Euphonium plays nobly. Closing bars excellent.

Allo Brill. Splendidly played save for one slip. Good tulti cornets. Allo Brar is another fine piece of work. The technique is most fine indeed. A brilliant finish is made to a very fine performance. Exhilarating wind-up!
