WHEN the first Leicester Brass Band Festival was held in 1927 its objects were to show some measure of appreciation for the good work of the Leicester Royal Infirmary, to raise money for local Charities, and to assist the Brass Band Movement.

The Leicester Brass Band Festivals have endowed Five Beds in the Leicester Royal Infirmary at a total cost of £5,000.

Since the Nationalisation of the Hospitals, the Festival Committee have divided all profits from the Festival between various local Charities, each year approximately £300.

The 1954 Festival produced £330 for equal division, resulting in £66 for each of the charities.





HARRY MORTIMER, O.B.E.

THE NAME OF MORTIMER is synonymous with brass bands—Harry Mortimer is the eldest son of Fred Mortimer, who was perhaps the best-known figure in the Brass Band world in recent years.

Harry Mortimer started to play at the age of eight, and conducted his first Band (Luton Red Cross Junior Band) when only fourteen.

Was subsequently leader of the Luton Band when they won the Crystal Palace Championship in 1923.

And later, leader of Foden's Motor Works Band for many years, including the time when they achieved the unique "double hat-trick" (never equalled by any other Band) of winning the Crystal Palace Championship six times in seven years.

Was also leader on the Band's South African tour in 1936.

Principal Trumpet in the Halle, Liverpool Philharmonic and B.B.C. Northern Orchestra for eight years, and also Trumpet Professor at the Royal Manchester College of Music.

He conducted the winning Band at the British Open Championship at Belle Vue nine times, and the winning Band at the National Championship of Great Britain seven times since 1945.

Joined the B.B.C. as Brass and Military Band Supervisor in September, 1942. For many years has shared the conducting of the Massed Bands at the annual Championship Concerts with Sir Malcolm Sargent and Sir Adrian Boult, and has also conducted many other broadcast concerts of massed brass bands, both in London and all the B.B.C.'s Regional centres. He has also conducted brass and military band concerts and broadcasts in Germany, Holland, Switzerland, New Zealand and Australia.

No stranger to Leicester, he has been coming to the De Montfort Hall for over thirty years.
