Gounod's first marked success was in England, where selections from his "Messe Solennelle" were given by Hullah's Choir (1851). Gounod possessed a rare gift of original melody; his orchestration is always masterly, and the peculiar mystic glamour which pervades his compositions makes his music singularly attractive.
