1. MARCH, "Cossack," 2. OVERTURE, "Crown Diamonds," Daniel Francois Esprit Auber, the author of many brilliant Operas, was born at Caen on 29th January, 1782, and died at Paris, 12th May, 1871, at the age of eighty-nine years. His works are characterised by sparkling vivacity, grace, and eloquence, clear and piquant melody, together with lightness of expression and felicity of invention. 3. Selection, "Il Trovatore," - - - -"Il Trovatore" is essentially a popular Opera, with a wide appeal to all classes of hearers, rather than the favourite of the cultured few; and certain of its numbers, such as the beautiful "Miserere Scene," will never be forgotten while music lasts. 4. Selection, "Beethoven," - - - arr. A. Owen Beethoven himself was of heroic mould. His independent manly character—he was a democrat of democrats; his tragic affliction-for the last 30 years of his life he was stone deaf and never heard a note of the great works composed during that period; and his domestic trials make Beethoven's story one of great and pathetic interest. His music reflects the man himself and is clear and simple, with the simplicity of genius.

5. NATIONAL MELODIES, "Echoes of Scotland," - - arr. Round

The people of every country regard their own national melodies as far before the folk-songs of other lands, and this is natural and commendable, no doubt. Scotland has a full share of beautiful song-tunes known far and wide. A well-known writer (not a Scotsman) recently wrote of the emotional effect of Scottish music, remarking on the hush that steals over a music-hall audience when the opening strains of "Annie Laurie" are heard.

6. THREE DANCES from "Henry VIII," - - - German

(a) Morris Dance. (b) Shepherd's Dance.

(c) Torch Dance.

This was composed for Sir Henry Irving's revival of Snakespeare's immortal play, "Henry VIII." in 1892. Although of Arabian origin, the sprightly Morris Dance (or "Moreiss Danss," as it is called in the old Scottish ballad, "Christes Kirk of the Grene") was a great favourite in Scotland, and Sir Walter Scott introduces a description in his "Fair Maid of Perth." The Shepherd's Dance, a plaintive pastoral melody, is typical of the music of our countryside. The wild Torch Dance was one of the Court dances, usually connected with weddings. Holyrood Palace saw not a few in the "good old days." [H.F.]

7. VALSE, "Wendische Weizen," - - - Gung'l

Josef Gung'l began life in Hungary as a stocking-weaver's son, and ended as Kapellmeister to the Austrian Emperor in Vienna. Between times he had been schoolmaster, oboe player, artillery bandmaster, and conductor of his own orchestra, touring Europe and America. His metier was dance music and marches. A patriot, like all his countrymen, his first publication was a Hungarian march. His waltzes, however, are distinguished for melody and rhythm, and are worthy of the place they hold as classic dance measures. [J.]
