1845	Band screened from judge, draw for position of play, drums not
	allowed, maximum 12 players, own choice of piece
1855	Test piece plus own choice
1856	Test piece only

1868 Names of bandsmen submitted one month before contest

1886 Initial grading system

1889 No pre-performance of test piece, conductors not allowed to play Maximum of 24 players, approved adjudicators only, players to be 1893 registered with only one band

1895 Two sections 1900 Three sections

1902 Five sections, Championship section bands in uniform, players must be members of a band for three months minimum

Championship bands play seated

1924 All bands play seated

1946 Regional qualifying contests, National Register of Brass Bandsmen

1973 Percussion in Championship section

Percussion in all sections 1976


London



Contesting was rough in those days.....

Bacup Times 1869 - "Hundreds in our mills and workshops may be heard betting on the result of the contest. In addition there is a vast amount of foul language employed . . . But worst of all, perhaps, is the general drinking and drunkenness that is occasioned by these contests Hundreds of drunken people were seen staggering in all directions The evils that flow from brass band contests we believe are far greater than those connected with bull-baiting and other sports put down long ago."

Manchester 1902 - journey from a contest - "In a compartment jammed with 18 people four of whom were drunk, six of whom smoked the vilest pigtail and the remainder passing the time up to Ramsbottom either quarrelling over the judges decisions or falling asleep and emitting ghoulish nerve-trying snores."

Lincoln 1892 - The spectators gave chase to George Asch, the judge, who had to run across country to avoid being thrown in a nearby lake. He had been careless enough to read out the names of the winning bands in the wrong order.
