
A.T.M. WORKS BAND

The A.T.M. Works Band was formed in September, 1941, from employees of Messrs. Automatic Telephone & Electric Co., Ltd., under the auspices of Mr. F. C. Burstall, one of the company directors. Many concerts, parades, and other functions have seen this band advance by leaps and bounds under the able conductorship of Mr. George Gardner, and are making their mark in the Liverpool area. Now in their 3rd year with many an engagement satisfactorily completed, they look forward to a Belle Vue with the A.T.M. Works Band as a worthy competitor.

Mr. J. D. Crook, the company's labour officer, has acted as organising secretary since the formation of the band. The many performances given have been for the services, hospitals, camps, charity parades, parade services, park performances, and last but not least, in the canteens and gardens for the workers.
