

Newbiggin Colliery Band (Mr. J. Carr, Bandmaster).

Formed in 1911, the band had as its first conductor, "Dick" Taylor, and had its share of ups and downs until 1922, when, under the professional tuition of Mr. G. Hawkins, they were awarded 2nd prize in the Collieries' Championship in an entry of 16 bands. In 1924 Mr. R. Kirkup took over the band and held the position for 10 years, when he was succeeded by the present bandmaster, Mr. J. Carr.

The band have a fine set of Boosey and Hawkes' instruments, and the latest addition to their ranks is "Tommy" Nichol of Choppington, who was awarded a gold medal for his performance on his N.V.A. cornet at the Collieries Contest.
