OAK ALYN C.E.T.S. BRASS BAND.

The parish of Gwersyllt lies about 24 miles from Wrexham, one of the principal towns of North Wales, and the band was started in August, 1896, principally through the efforts of the Misses Irven, of Oak Alyn, ladies who were always to the fore in every good work. The band was mainly established for the purpose of keeping together the young men of the Gwersyllt branch of the C.E.T.S. and assisting at anything got up for the benefit of the parishioners.

The number of instruments was 13 and under the tuition of Mr. J. R. Williams, formerly of Blackburn and Rochdale, whose expenses were nick by weekly subscriptions, the band made rapid progress, but as time went on, one after another reaving, there were sometimes half the instruments idle, and engagements had to be carried out with nine and sometimes only seven players. Meeting with scarcely any support, no wonder those who had been in from the beginning were nearly disheartenest, but with true British pluck, they kept pegging away, till by and by the question of getting more instruments arose, and starting with two trombones in 1891, the increase went on, fill now there are 22, and hopes are entertained of being able shortly to raise a new set of 24.

During the great coal strike of 1893, the services of Mr Williams had to be dispensed with and the duties of bandonster had to be undertaken by the Secretary, who since the commencement had laboured most assiduously in keeping the band together, ably assisted by the Solo Euphonium, Mr. W. Jones, and several others.

In view of a contest, the first to be held in the neighbourhood, outside of which the hand was

practically unknown, the services of Mr. T. Valentine, of Manchester, were secured early in the present year, and under his baten the band have simply worked wonders, as will be seen by the appended list of prizes, especially considering the fact that the past season was their very first on the centest field.
